Budget Saving Proposal 2025/26 - Removal of Homestart Funding over three years from 2025/26

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1. Overview

This document has been generated from information entered into the Integrated Impact Assessment system.

Homestart delivers services in the family home providing practical advice and support. Homestart coordinates volunteers to work with vulnerable families with children aged 0-5 years. They liaise with other professionals and parents to assess the need of children and their families and offer tailored support to meet these. They signpost parents to other services/training and support them to access these as appropriate. Homestart supports families of 423 children by 161 visiting volunteers.

The budget saving proposal is to terminate Aberdeenshire Council's contract with Homestart, phasing out the funding over 3 years. The current status of contract is under PIN notice with contract extended and currently no notice period required.

The current budget allocation for the Homestart contract is £232,000 and the proposal is to reduce funding as follows:

FY25/26: budget allocation £155,000 (budget saving of £77,333)

FY 26/27: budget allocation £77,333 (budget saving of £77,333)

FY 27/28: Budget allocation £0 (budget saving of £77,333)

The phasing out of funding should allow Homestart to phase out support from existing caseload and/or also to explore opportunities for alternative funding streams.

Further, Aberdeenshire Council have no statutory duty to provide a home-service to children and parents. The Aberdeenshire Health & Social Care Partnership (AHSCP) has responsibility for the health visiting service who deliver a core home visiting programme for all families and act as the Named Person under the national GIRFEC policy and practice model.

Aberdeenshire Council provide Early Learning and Childcare with eligible 2 year olds and all 3-5 year olds entitled to access 1140 provision. ELC staffing are also trained and skilled in working with vulnerable children and parents and will refer into partner agencies for targeted and specialise support as appropriate and required.

Given the ongoing financial challenges being faced by both the Early Years service and the wider Council, the proposal is to terminate the funding of an externally provided, non-statutory service to protect the funding and delivery of the EY service's core function and responsibility.

During screening 6 of 11 questions indicated that detailed assessments were required, the screening questions and their answers are listed in the next section. This led to 3 out of 5 detailed impact assessments being completed. The assessments required are:

- Childrens' Rights and Wellbeing
- Equalities and Fairer Scotland Duty
- Health Inequalities

In total there are 0 positive impacts as part of this activity. There are 11 negative impacts, of these negative impacts, 2 have been mitigated and 9 cannot be mitigated satisfactorily.

Age (Younger)	Given that Homestart work with families with children who are aged 0 to 5 years old, the removal of such a service will only impact negatively on this age range. For many families, engagement with Homestart may be the only support that they have with the exception of Health Visitors. Can be No mitigated	
	Justification	Aberdeenshire Council EY service will continue to provide ELC to all 3-5 year olds and to eligible 2 year olds and will continue to provide support to those children and parents/ families, working in partnership with other agencies. Most of the children/families currently supported by Homestart will move into ELC provision over the course of the 3-year phasing out of funding and will therefore be suppored through this universal service, from where referrals can be made into partner agencies and services as required. All 0-5 years olds will also receive support from the AHSCP health visiting service and the Health Visitor / Named Person will be able to initiate multi-agency action planning where required. The negative impact can be partially mitigated by the continuation of core/statutory services but it is acknowledged that the removal of this enhanced service will impact on children going forward.

	Justification	Although there will be a continuation of core/statutory maternity and health services available to pregnant women, removing this enhanced early intervention service will have an impact that cannot be mitigated by Aberdeenshire Council. It is further acknowledged that other statutory services are experiencing the same financial challenges and cannot be expected to mitigate such impacts either. There may be opportunities for Homestart to explore alternative funding streams over the 3-year phasing out of funding and Aberdeenshire Council can provide some support regarding this.

	Justification	Aberdeenshire Council EY service will continue to provide ELC to all 3-5 year olds and to eligible 2 year olds and will continue to provide support to those children and their mothers, working in partnership with other agencies. Most of the children/mothers currently supported by Homestart will move into ELC provision over the course of the 3-year phasing out of funding and will therefore be supported through this universal service, from where referrals can be made into partner agencies and services as required. All 0-5 years olds and their mothers will also receive support from the AHSCP health visiting service and the Health Visitor / Named Person will be able to initiate multi-agency action planning where required. The negative impact can be partially mitigated by the continuation of core/statutory services but it is acknowledged that the removal of this enhanced service will impact on children and their mothers going forward.

No Negative Impacts Can Be Mitigated.

The majority of families who seek support from Homestart, aren't engaging with other services and aren't accessing Early Learning and Childcare. Homestart is providing a support service that meets a need that as far as is understood isn't provided by any Council services or any other third sector organisations.

Further Aberdeenshire Council have no statutory duty to provide a home-service to children and parents. The Aberdeenshire Health & Social Care Partnership (AHSCP) has responsibility for the health visiting service who deliver a core home visiting programme for all families and act as the Named Person under the national GIRFEC policy and practice model.

Aberdeenshire Council provide Early Learning and Childcare with eligible 2 year olds and all 3-5 year olds entitled to access 1140 provision. ELC staffing are also trained and skilled in working with vulnerable children and parents and will refer into partner agencies for targeted and specialist support as appropriate and required.

Given the ongoing financial challenges being faced by both the Early Years service and the wider Council, the proposal is to terminate the funding of an externally provided, non-statutory service to protect the funding and delivery of the EY service's core function and responsibility. The funding will be phased out over 3 years to allow for transition planning, securing alternative funding and to partially mitigate the impact on children and families.

	Justification	It is acknowledged that Aberdeenshire Council cannot mitigate this impact through our core/ statutory services. However, by phasing out the funding over 3 years, we can support Homestart to access alternative funding. Further, ELC provision will continue to provide support to children and their families, making referrals to specialist services as required. However, it is acknowledged that this impact cannot be fully mitigated

6.4. Overall Outcome

No Negative Impacts Can Be Mitigated.

Although children and their families are supported by core/statutory services, it is acknowledged that there is no equivalent to the enhanced service that Homestart provide. Aberdeenshire Council can continue to work with Homestart and other Third Sector organisations to support vulnerable children and families but cannot continue to fund non-statutory services at the detriment of our core service functions. The phasing out of funding should mitigate some impacts but not all impacts for all children/families can be mitigated.

Further, Aberdeenshire Council have no statutory duty to provide a home-service to children and parents. The Aberdeenshire Health & Social Care Partnership (AHSCP) has responsibility for the health visiting service who deliver a core home visiting programme for all families and act as the Named Person under the national GIRFEC policy and practice model.

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Given the ongoing financial challenges being faced by both the Early Years service and the wider Council, the proposal is to terminate the funding of an externally provided, non-statutory service to protect the funding and delivery of the EY service's core function and responsibility. The funding will be phased out over 3 years to allow for transition planning, securing alternative funding and to partially mitigate the impact on children and families
