

HOW TO VOTE ON ELECTION DAY—THURSDAY 10TH MARCH 2011

At registration on Thursday 10th March your teacher will give you a Polling Card (see below). Take the polling card with you to the Linden Centre, which is where you will go to vote. Each class has been allocated a different time to go to vote (see page 10). The teacher you have at

this time will accompany you to the Polling Place.

Once at the Linden Centre show the Polling Card to the official. Tell them your name and class. This should match the information on your Polling Card.

You will be given 3 ballot papers. On all 3 ballot papers mark an 'X'. On the **lilac** ballot paper you should choose

the **CANDIDATE** of your choice. On the **peach** ballot paper choose a **PARTY**. On the grey ballot paper you decide whether you want the system for electing Members of Parliament (MPs) to the House of Commons to change from the First-Past-The-Post system to the Alternative Vote system by marking an' **X**' against 'YES' or 'NO'. Examples of all the ballot papers are contained in this Election Special.

Take the ballot papers to the Polling Booth and make your decisions in private.

Then put the ballot papers into the colour-coded Ballot Boxes. Each ballot paper goes into a different box.


Your teacher will accompany the class back to school.

THE NATS TAKE THE LEAD

The Maths Department conducted a pre-election poll on 1st March 2011. Pupils were asked which party they intend to vote for.

THE SYSTEM OF VOTING IN SCOTLAND

Scotland uses an electoral system called the Additional Member System (AMS). It is made up of 2 voting systems: First-Past-The-Post and the Regional Party Vote.

This means voters gets 2 votes—one for a candidate and one for a party. There are 129 MSPs elected to the Scottish Parliament. Of the 129 MSPs, 73 are elected by First-Past-The-Post and are known as constituency MSPs while 56 are elected by the Regional Party List system. These MSPs are called 'additional members' or 'top-up' MSPs.

The overall effect of the AMS is it produces a roughly proportional result. What this means is that parties receive roughly the same percentage of seats in the Scottish Parliament as the percentage of votes cast for the party.

This is seen as a big advantage of the AMS as it is fair.



However, it tends to lead to coalition or minority government. Coalition government is when 2 or more parties share power and form the government. The first two elections to the Scottish Parliament saw the Labour Party and the Lib Dems join forces and run Scotland as a coalition government.

Currently the SNP run Scotland as a minority government. This means that while they have the most seats they do not have more seats than all the other parties put together. Therefore other parties can gang up against the government and stop it passing laws.

PARTY MANIFESTOS

The Conservative Party

The Economy

Financial savings must be made within Scotland's economy. As a party the Conservatives have faced up to this. We would like to give Scotland more control over the block grant. We would like to avoid offering benefits such as free school meals and prescriptions to those who can already afford them. We need to put a greater emphasis on regenerating Scotland's economy by offering incentives for people to start their own businesses and to employ apprentices. This will reduce unemployment throughout Scotland. We would also like to eradicate child poverty by 2020, which still remains to be a problem in Scotland under the current SNP government

Health Gare

We not only back the traditional values of the NHS we also have a vision for its future. The cleanliness of Scottish hospitals is a top priority, The Electronic Bed Management System with Infection Tracking proposed by the Scottish Conservatives is currently being piloted and we want to see it being rolled out across Scotland if it is successful.

We oppose the phasing out of prescription charges and we feel that it is wasteful to give higher rate taxpayers free prescriptions when public spending is under enormous pressure. We believe that A&E departments should remain open locally in Scotland and we are happy to have halted Labours plans to close them.



Education

Improving schools is one of the most important things that we could do as a party. To do this we are going to give teachers more powers. To make parents a part of the school reform. This has worked in other countries such as the USA and Canada.

The SNP have been unable to secure jobs for many teachers that have passed through the process for full registration. This has made it hard for teachers to find a job at all, let alone in their own area.

We would like to establish Second Chance Centres in Scotland to help persistent troublemakers to get back on track. We want to ensure that the highest of standards are maintained in the Scottish education system.

The Conservative Party would also like to see more sporting activities for young people therefore we would like to set up sports trust funds to allow for more competitive sports.

Crime

The Conservative party would like to restore faith in the criminal justice system. The conservatives would like to introduce 1,000 new police officers in Scotland. We want to see our police officers back out on the beat therefore we will reduce the amount of paperwork that they have to do.

We would like to take a hard-line approach to drink and drug offences and also to impose tougher sentences for knife crimes.

We want the people to know that the police and the government are listening to what they have to say.



Environment

We would like to have a Conservative vision for our future, based on Conservative values. We believe that it is our responsibility to create a clean and healthy environment to pass onto our children. Green issues should be at the heart of our politics and of our government in Scotland.

Voting System Referendum

Currently Members of Parliament (MPs) are elected to the House of Commons using First-Past-The-Post (FPTP). Some people would like the system to change. The public are being asked if they would support a change to the Alternative Vote (AV) system in a referendum (a vote by the public rather than politicians).

FPTP— Each voting area elects an MP by putting an 'X' next to the candidate of their choice. The candidate with the most votes in each constituency wins the seat.

AV— Candidates are ranked in order of preference, e.g. '1' for 1st, '2' for second, etc on the ballot paper. If a candidate gets more than 50% of the vote they are elected. If not, the candidate with the fewest votes is eliminated and second choices are allocated to the remaining candidates. This continues until one candidate gets more than 50%.

Advantages of First-Past-The-Post

- It is a simple system— an 'X' is marked next to the candidate of your choice;
- It is fair—the person with the most votes wins the seat;
- It usually leads to stable government with one party in charge. They can implement their policies and the people can judge whether they have done a good job or not.

Disadvantages of Alternative Vote

- AV is complex. People may be put off voting because it is more complicated as candidates must be ranked in order of preference;
- It is unfair—the candidate who comes 2nd or 3rd can actually be elected;
- It gives supporters of fringe or extreme parties more say than a supporter who supports a mainstream party.

Disadvantages of First-Past-The-Post

- Candidates can be elected with less than 50% of the vote—this is undemocratic;
- It is not proportional—the number of seats a party gets is not proportional to the votes. For example, Labour won power in 2005 with 35% of the popular vote;
- It disadvantages smaller parties.

Advantages of Alternative Vote

- It is fairer than FPTP because candidates must get over 50% of the vote to be elected;
- As second and third preference votes are taken into account, there are no wasted votes
- Candidates will have to work harder to get elected as 50+% of the vote is needed.
