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1. Overview

This document has been generated from information entered into the Integrated Impact Assessment system.

As part of saving proposals, a saving of £41,000 has been submitted from the General Fund - Affordable Housing staffing budget line. This IIA considers the impact of these proposed savings.

During screening 8 of 11 questions indicated that detailed assessments were required, the screening questions and their answers are listed in the next section. This led to 4 out of 5 detailed impact assessments being completed. The assessments required are:

- Childrens' Rights and Wellbeing
- Equalities and Fairer Scotland Duty
- Health Inequalities
- Town Centres First

In total there are 0 positive impacts as part of this activity. There are 22 negative impacts, of these negative impacts, 0 have been mitigated and 22 cannot be mitigated satisfactorily.
